Education vs fuel

Diesel generators not only pump out carbon dioxide they steal education from students in low income schools. Replacing diesel power with solar in remote Pacific island schools creates new education opportunities because the money saved on fuel is spent on education.

For example, Rabi Island School is saving over \$7000 per year that is now spent on books, software and other education resources. That's a big deal considering the average family income is less than \$100 per month. That solar system will also save over 150 tonnes of carbon dioxide.
